Child Labour Monitoring and Remediation System (CLMRS)

Introduction

International Cocoa Initiative

International Cocoa Initiative (ICI) is a leading organization that promotes child-centred community development and responsible supply chain management in cocoa communities. ICI works with the cocoa industry, civil society, farmer organizations, international organizations and national governments of cocoaproducing countries to ensure a better future for children and contribute to the elimination of child labour.

ICI CLMRS

Child Labour Monitoring and Remediation Systems (CLMRS) are systems designed to identify children who are working or at risk of working, and to put in place support to prevent and address it effectively. Many companies use CLMRS as part of their efforts to tackle child labour in their supply chains. When implemented effectively, these systems can reduce child labour by up to a third.

In practice, CLMRS as implemented by ICI revolves around proximity agents who visit households, raise awareness of the dangers of child labour and identify children engaged in hazardous activities. If a child is found to be involved in child labour, information about their situation is collected via a digital application, and support is provided to them, their family and/or their community.

Once a child receives support, proximity workers conduct regular follow-up visits to assess how the children are progressing and to determine whether further support is required. These follow-up visits are crucial because, even after receiving support, it is not always easy for a child to stop working for good, especially as the risk of child labour increases as they grow older.

Data collection tools

ICI's CLMRS data collection tools in Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire have been developed and revised to comply with national and international legislation on child labour. They help chocolate and cocoa companies to exercise due diligence regarding human rights and child labour.

These tools have been developed as tools for the identification and monitoring of child labour cases in order to identify the most appropriate remedial activities and ultimately to remove children from all forms of child labour.

In practice, the collection tools consist of questionnaires administered by proximity agents in the communities where they work. The data collected is recorded on their smartphones, stored in a centralized database and subsequently verified, adjusted and validated before being taken into account for analysis.

The tools in this document take into account the lessons learned from the implementation of the CLMRS by ICI since 2012 and are structured into 5 main elements:

- **Data sheet A: Community Profile** This sheet contains general information about the community (location, access to services, school structures). The Proximity Agent fill in this form on the first arrival in each community and update it every two years.
- Data sheet B: Overview of the farmer's household This sheet contains information on the household of each farmer covered by the CLMRS when no child labour risk model is used (farm size, use of outside labour, household members, child labour cases observed and / or reported). The Proximity Agent conducts an interview with each household when setting up the system and update the data yearly. If a risk model is used, the update frequency can be adjusted.



In the case of dual communities, this data sheet can also be used by the Community Child Protection Committee (CCPC) to take a census of people living in the community and to identify potential cases of child labour at the community level.


- Data sheet C: Visit of cocoa farms (plantations) This sheet is to be filled in by the Proximity Agents during visits to the cocoa farms of farmer members covered by the CLMRS. During these visits, the agents identify those present in the farm visited and reports any case of child labour. These visits are unannounced and take place minimum once a year at a later date than the visit within the farmer's household.
- Data sheet D: Follow-up / tracking child worker This sheet contains more precise information on the situation of children identified as workers (by observation and / or by declaration) who will then be used to propose remedial actions specific to their case. This form must be filled in as soon as a child has been identified to carry out at least one hazardous activity. If it is not possible to fill in this form immediately after the child labour situation is identified, it should be scheduled to be held as soon as possible after the visit that led to its identification. Then, it must be updated every 3 to 6 months until the child is declared safe from any hazardous activity between two consecutive visits.
- Data sheet E: Awareness-raising sessions If a child has been observed and / or has reported performing at least one hazardous activity during one of the Proximity Agent visit, the latter must carry out a proximity awareness-raising session on the themes related to the hazardous work carried out. Each year, the agent must also conduct at least one group awareness-raising session in each community where producers covered by the CLMRS reside. Subsequently, the agent fill in the corresponding data sheet E which records the number of people present at the awareness-raising session and the topics covered.

Chronology of administration of the ICI's CLMRS data sheets

Based on the proven ICI model, the CLMRS methodology aimed at capacity building (through training and awareness-raising on child labour), monitoring and remediation is implemented according to the diagram on the following page.

A similar scheme may be developed in future with different periodicities as part of a risk-based approach based on different farmer's profiles.
